World War II veteran the last in Kern Valley

The last World War II Veteran in all of Kern Valley, Fernando Hernandez was recently at the VFW during the Honor Flight Breakfast Thursday, May 9.

He told the Kern Valley Sun, "I've been told that I'm the last World War II

veteran out here in Kern Valley." Hernandez said, "I joined

when I was 17 years old in 1943. And I joined the Navy.'

Hernandez has an older story to tell, being senior to our Vietnam War veterans. He said, "They put me aboard on a troop transport. We'd transport the troops

back and forth. Well we'd transport the Army with all their equipment, jeeps and stuff that they had, (and) tanks.

Before the war was over in 1945 the Navy sent Hernandez to French Indochina, which is now known as Vietnam. Former ruler of China, General Chiang Kai-shek's army was there,

because he was the ruler at China at that time, according to Hernandez who said the US Navy transported the Chinese Army to Formosa, which is now Taiwan.

After the war was over Hernandez was discharged and went home.

Kern Fire Safe Council visits chamber

Wendy Ward Fire Mitigation Coordinator with the Kern Fire Safe Council spoke at the Kern River Valley Chamber of Commerce meeting, Wednesday, May 8.

Ward told the chamber that having grown up in Kernville she is familiar with evacuations, fire mitigation, roadside clearance and home hardening.

The Fire Safe Council's three branches at one point disbanded. The branches later determined to revive, becoming the one Kern County Fire Safe Council. She hopes others would join the council as volunteers. The council has applied

for a grant to be a pilot for the State of California, to identify areas needing mitigation partnered with the Kern River Ranger District. The council also works with the Bureau of Land Management and Kern County Fire Department toward its fire prevention goals.

The council offers

educational programs for grades 4 and 5 students teaching disaster planning, evacuation and preparation. The council's educational program helps students understand their footprint in the forest.

The Kern Fire Safe Council encourages home hardening and property clearance for homeowners and renters. The council wants to create

Fire Wise Communities. They propose to encourage communities to establish grass roots committees beginning fire safety neighborhood watches. The council hopes the volunteer groups would plan to become fire wise and ultimately attain better insurance rates.

"Being a fire wise community could possibly help you retain your insurance, she said. "Working with your neighbors you will have compliers. You will have ones that will not do what they need to do, and that's just the nature of it. But doing what you can reduces the opportunity for wildfire to spread to your home and to yourself."

Ward said that a minimum

of eight residents would be needed to form each Fire Wise Group. Not everyone in the neighborhood has to participate with the Fire Wise Group. However those not complying would not reap the benefits of the group. Ward posed the idea of neighbors complying through volunteering a certain amount of hours toward the group's fire prevention goals.

Ward warned the chamber that ultimately such Fire Wise Groups could become mandated because of newer insurance expectations. She said it would be easier to get in on forming such groups at the outset of the movement towards that goal.

At the Kern Valley Healthcare District's (KVHD's) board meeting, Thursday, May 9 the board or directors heard about potential changes, which the hospital board and staff can expect may impact Kern Valley Hospital's budget.

During Chief Executive Officer Tim McGlew's report he said California hospitals were focused on a couple of bills, one from the office of Health Care Affordability, which was to meet a 3.5% cost of providing health care. Every year the amount is supposed to taper down until it meets 3%

McGlew thought the legislation could impact the seismic project the hospital was working on. He said there has only been one case where a hospital got charged for not meeting requirements from such legislation

Such legislation has a lot of people frustrated, McGlew explained to the board. "We also talk about the seismic bill, the state basically is looking to add another three more years, and then eventually an additional five years beyond that, if the cost issues come into play," he said. "If the hospitals basically claim that they don't have the money to get this thing done within the five year period, then the state will come in, and the state will audit the cost of the project."

If the state determines the costs are as claimed, the state would have to come up with the money to facilitate the project. McGlew thinks the state would not shut the hospital down, in such a case.

Board member Gene Parks pondered whether such a scenario would be good news for the district because KVHD would

project if the state provided the money.

McGlew said SB43 is the efforts to change the 51-50 definition in the state of California, which means the state would increase the requirements to provide behavioral health services. "Basically the way that it was described to us, this will be disastrous for the hospitals," he said.

On another note, Mc-Glew said the hospital is still conducting interviews in an attempt find a new Chief Financial Officer. One applicant is coming up for an interview soon. The board members and CEO prefer the ideal candidate for the position to be local, and not further away than Bakersfield.

"We're getting ready to do the minimum wage adjustments," McGlew said, "That worked out to about a 2.4% increase." The adjustment would also increase pay

amount of \$30 an hour. The adjustments are based upon the new minimum wage requirements, which California legislation imposed, for hospital and medical staff.

McGlew told the board, in his report, that because of a bill going forward to provide cost based reimbursement to the rural hospitals, California Hospitalization conducted an analysis to see what losses hospitals endured. McGlew said, "What our survey showed is that there's roughly about a \$3 million lag in our costs versus what we get paid."

He also said, "We as a public facility are eligible for some amount of payments that the private hospitals are not. So we get a rate range adjustment. And that's what the state provides us each year to make up the difference between the costs that we've been reimbursed.'

May is National Military Appreciation Month, acknowledging all branches of the US military.

Thursday May 9, Gary Zuber, the founder of Honor Flight Breakfasts in Kern Valley and the Kern River Valley Chamber of Commerce's Man of the Year explained the value of the recognition. "It's America's way of honoring our military branches for keeping us safe and protecting our country," he said.

The United States Congress deemed National Military Appreciation Month as the month of May, back in 1990, for Americans to express gratitude for the past and current service to the county

"We actually honor our Veterans every month, not just in the month of May, with the (Honor Flight) Breakfasts and with Honor Flight," he said. "We're going to have another flight of over 100 veterans going back to D.C. So far we've flown over 2,000 veterans back to D.C. to honor them."

Each year there are at least two Honor Flights out to Washington D.C. The Honor Flights usually occur in fall and spring when weather is milder, and currently there is a minimum of two flights each year, according to Zuber.



In the past there used to be more flights occurring annually just because the airport used to only allow smaller groups be flown out of Bakersfield.

"I got on board with Honor Flight in the summer of 2012. And in November was the first veterans from our area that we recruited to go, World War II, and that was over 100 veterans, at that time, that went," Zuber said.

Plane reservations are behind the

Honor Flight started out as only World War II guys. Currently it includes Vietnam veterans and more recent war veterans

Collaborative assists underserved of the valley


The Kern River Valley Bridge Connection (KRVBC) met Wednesday, May 8, in Lake Isabella, to collaborate ideas to serve the underserved residents of the valley.

The group brainstormed some ideas that members proposed would be good ways to serve the underserved of the community.

Gary Ananian, founder of the Kern River Conservancy and board member of the Kernville Chamber of Commerce shared thoughts that bringing remote tech jobs to the valley from outside would be helpful and providing a tech job fair would be a good idea for the KRVBC to do. "I think these job fairs that we keep having over here, I've attended some of them, and I've noticed that there's a lack of youth going to them. My opinion is we're not providing the youth here with the opportunities that the youth are desiring, tech jobs, remote jobs, videography, social media that they're into," he said.

Chris Zuber of Kernville Cowork said he liked the idea of trying to make use of the skills of local youth by giving them opportunities for internships within the community for work experience.

Kat Barnum from America's Job Center in Lake Isabella suggested that the KRVBC could benefit the community by providing a tire pressure event, sort of like a car safety check, with volunteers knowledgeable on the topic. Founder of the KRVBC Karen Zuber said checking windshield wipers, before storm season, and a carwash added to the event would be a good plan. Another idea Chris Zuber came up with was connecting the community with churches sharing Thanksgiving feasts

and food distribution events, like a food awareness event.

Karen Zuber said the idea of organizing a Veterans Day Parade with the Kern River Valley Art Association, to honor vets, would be a good idea.

She also suggested that a December toy drive and distributing Christmas trees, winter clothing, and toys would be helpful to the community and maybe a September umbrella drive. Gary Zuber co founder of the KRVBC said he was concerned about homeless people dying of exposure in the valley during colder months. Eric Simpson of Hopesters said he thought the KRVBC should work with Flood Ministries, giving the underserved items they need, but also encouraging homeless to go to Bakersfield where they can attain shelter. Other concepts the KRVBC came up with for assisting valley residents were gift baskets, meal delivery, activities to lower depression levels, help with home weatherizing, and help with pets possibly working hand in hand with animal rescue organizations. They also brainstormed the ideas of having a tree planting in honor of Arbor Day or Earth Day in April, providing Valentines cards for seniors that kids in the community could make, donating cards for homeless kids to distribute at school, reviving river safety

rial was astounding in detail. The troops each signifying a different job moving through the rice paddy in an organized pattern gave truth to the happening of the war.

In a particularly unplanned blessing, the veterans received as they were in a state of remembrance. A group of school aged kids who were on a field trip made it a point to thank as many veterans for their service as time allowed. When this occurred, it seemed each veteran stood a little taller in their stance.

It was ready to move on to the next sight. A short walk supposedly, that took about 10 minutes actually. This was going be the toughest spot as many on the trip felt a twinge of guilt. This memorial, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial was the simplest of all in reality. Names, just names of those on the wall that did not come home from a war that in some minds should not have been fought. But as the people meandered their way along the path, it was quiet in respect and murmurs of those searching for a name filled the open air.

From Abraham Lincoln's words on the structure to the huge statue of him sitting in the chair. This was a man that needed to try and heal a country that was divided. Despite all that were against him, he chose to unite

rather than separate.

With all the time left on the trip it was time to head to Baltimore to see Fort McHenry. Some say, this was the signature of when this country actually became a country. The story of Francis Scott Key and his words that would become the Star-Spangled Banner, our national anthem, showed how the back bone of this country that took on all enemies. In this case the British. Surviving this gave the American people hope and a new resilience to continue the war to make this country the United States of America.

One last time Honor Flight filled up their rides. The next stop would be the airport and the return trip to Bakersfield. Once the plane was filled and another water salute it was in the air heading west. The time had come to move on from the past and get back to the future

The passengers of Honor Flight 49 settled in, but there were still a few surprises left. Some I will reveal and others I won't. I do not want to spoil

it for those who have yet to make the trip. As the plane crossed the country and the time was near to land, one could sense the anticipation of returning home. The plane was emptied and the homecoming was a huge celebration of welcoming home the veterans. The celebration ordeal is overwhelming as family, friends, volunteers, high school groups, and the media filled the small space to tell all those that made the trip WELCOME HOME, WE APPRECIATE YOU, and THANK YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE!

We live in an area common to rattlesnakes and Kern Valley Hospital wants to remind you to watch out for yourselves and your pets! Our hospital has Crofab available in our Emergency Department.

If bitten and left untreated, the bite may result in severe medical problems including affecting your circulatory system by destroying skin tissues and blood cells and result in internal hemorrhaging. Untreated bites can also be fatal. The definitive treatment for snake venom poisoning is the administration of antivenin. The most important aspect of therapy is to get the victim to a medical facility as quickly as possible. We have Crofab - the only FDA- approved product for the treatment of all North American Pit Viper bites in adult and pediatric patients – available in our Emergency Department.

If bitten:

- Do not pick up the snake or try to trap it. NEVER handle a venomous snake, not even a dead one or its decapitated head.

Kern Valley's Bushling romps into CIF Masters Meet

Jayda Bushling had herself a day at the CIF Division championships qualifying meet in Caruthers.

There were 36 teams represented at the Division 4 championships. Kern Valley placed third as a team as they set six PR's and had one meet record on the day. A total of 10 Lady Broncs qualified for the Division 4 Championships.

Bushling led the charge to third place as she won two events and finished second in another to advance to the CIF Masters Meet this coming Saturday. She would set both a meet record and a PR in winning the 100m race in a time of 12.24. Bushling then leaped her way into the Masters meet in the tiple jump. She went a distance of 33' 6.5" to take the top spot. In her 200m race, Bushling finished as the runner up, but still will advance to the Masters. She ran the race in a time of 25.76. In her final event she would come in fourth. She

points at this meet.

The Lady Brones 4 x 100 relay team of Madelyn Beaton, Emily Blankenship, Kaya Manwell, and Scarlett Weber set a PR in the race. Their time was 55.97. Weber also competed in 100m and 200m races. She would take eighth in both and her times in both set PR's. Her times were 13.17 and 27.39, respectively. Beaton and Blankenship tied for sixth place in the high jump. They both jumped 4' 6" in the same number of attempts. Jessie Bunting finished in fifth in the high jump. She was two inches better than her two teammates.

Kyla Hacker competed in four events. Her top finish was in the 800m in a time of 2:36.43. She was 11th in the 1600m (5:54.19) and 13th in the 3200m (13:18.32). K. Hacker in the 400m came across the line in 15th place in a time of 1:09.56. Marissa Tate took her attempts in the discus for the Lady Broncs. She threw it 70' which placed her in the 16th spot. The last Kern Valley that competed at

With such a young team, I would expect these girls to get stronger and compete for the league title next year and send even more to the divisional championships."

He ran the race in a time of 16.88 to take fourth. Kyle Espinoza-Denys took fifth in the long jump. He leaped 19' 8.25" to set a PR. Espinoza-Denys was also part of the 4x 100m relay team that was sixth. Their combined time for the relay was 45.40 which was also a PR. The other runners of the group were Hinkey, Tristan Beckham, and Jack Montgomery.

Two Kern Valley athletes placed ninth in their events. Montgomery in the high jump (5' 6") and Hinkey in the 300m hurdles. Baden Mota set a PR in the 1600m race. His time was 4:55.92. Espinoza-Denys and Aiden Rapp were first in the unified 100m race. Their combined time was 27.61. Espinoza-Denys ran his race in 11.97, while Rapp's time was 15.64.

According to Kern Valley head coach Sabine Mixon, "At CIF they offer three categories - Varsity, Ambulatory, and Unified. Ambulatory are those who are physically disabled. According to the website, "Unified Track and Field is a special Olympic event that seeks to promote social inclusion by pairing athletes of similar ability in the same competition. Athletes with intellectual disabilities are paired up with those without them (known as "partners") for the various events including sprints, relays, middle-distance races, long jump, high jump, javelin throw and shot put. The idea behind unified track is that it doesn't matter if you have a disability; everyone has something unique about them that makes them special. Participants can work together towards common goals whilst forming mean

The local art association. publishing its first anthology, is about to release it hot off the press. And the editors expect the work to be on the shelves by June, according to senior editor, John Peterson, who is also a renowned poet and publisher at Poetic Matrix Press.
