Cemetery district nears fulfilling grand jury recommendations

The board of trustees addressed the public's concerns about meeting Grand Jury Report recommendations at the Kern River Valley Public Cemetery District meeting, Tuesday, August 13.

At previous meetings, and that day, visitors from the community had expressed a desire to see the issue, as an ongoing item on the agenda, to insure the recommendations are met.

Chairman trustee Harry Schutstz listed, during director's comments period, the ways the district had worked towards fulfilling the Kern County

Grand Jury Recommendations in its 2023-2024 report.

Schutstz said that he wanted the grand jury's report requirements on the agendas moving forward because the district wanted to fix the issues and show transparency.

"I wanted to just give a recap," he said listing the ways in which the district had already worked toward fulfilling the recommendations.

He read aloud, "F1. The District would function more effectively with an engaged five-member board.' Schutstz stated, "At this board meeting we have five (trustees.) So we are in

Indeed the board had met the criteria for a fifth trustee, introducing that day as the new trustee, Teresa "Kat" Barnum, who attended the meeting in a conference telephone call.

Regarding the second recommendation for the district to schedule board meetings monthly, to stay current on issues and keep agendas at a reasonable length, Schutstz said, "We're now monthly. This is our third meeting monthly. So we're in compliance."

As to the third issue the Grand Jury Report addressed, absence of meeting

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BLM updates public at chamber

Field Manager Gabe Garcia from Bureau of Land Management (BLM) spoke to the public about plans for Keysville, which have been up for public comment, Wednesday August 14, at the Kern River Valley Chamber of Commerce

Garcia said. "For recreation areas we want to make some changes and Keysville Recreation Area Management Plan (RAMP.)"

According to Garcia, at least five years ago BLM did a series of workshops and public meetings to get feedback about the plan. The Whole area is roughly 40,000 acres but the area that's used near Lake Isabella, when it comes to camping and area use is really only about one to two hundred acres. BLM gets roughly 150,000 visitors per year

to the area from May to October, mostly weekends and holidays

BLM plans to move camping off the river's edge by 100 feet. People were previously putting tents right on the

river's edge. BLM has blocked off the area, which is closer, even before the plan is approved.

Cemetery manager updates on staff, improvements, and Old Cemetery rescue plans

District manager Orion Sanders spoke about the Kern River Valley Cemetery District on Thursday August 15, to the Exchange Club, at a Paradise Cove

Sanders said, "As everybody probably knows recently we had a big change over at our cemetery district. And we have a whole new staff and we're working towards solving a lot of different issues. And we're moving forward and trying to build on the legacy that was left to us. And so there's a lot of things in the

The district's primary goal was to meet the grand jury reports recommendations. Sanders said, "About 90% of those (recommendations) are complete, as of now."

New staffing at the district includes a secretary handling paperwork with customers, another administrator working on bills and accounts receivable. Manager staff and office staff is dialed back in favor of hiring a grounds keeper. The groundskeeper works 32 hours weekly.

The district has well and water issues. The well needs a full acid wash in the system. It is adequate to water the entire system once maintenance is finished. It has been clogged with iron algae and the valve system has been about two-thirds automatic on the property. Personnel have been working on making sure the system is working properly.

The cemetery only missed one funeral or burial, in the process of its changeover, according to Sanders. However the district was able to do the service a bit

The district will be going to a new software system making it more interactive and better enabling visitors from the public to find where loved ones are buried. The district is researching files to make sure some unknown graves without



Orion Sanders district manager for the Kern River Valley Cemetery District tombstones are identified and placed into a digital filing system. Everything is currently being marked on a spreadsheet and will be brought into the 21st century,

according to Sanders.

The staff is revamping the website, rebuilding it and customizing it. They may be putting a fence around the south part of the cemetery without signage. They will be identifying and mapping what graves are whose. Sections will be marked and a map will map out sections for visitors to make it more customers

The groundskeeper is currently repairing sprinklers valves and water breaks, which in some cases requires digging, doing tree trimming, raking, working on greening the grass.

"I met with FEMA last week," said Sanders. "They have to come out and do a geotech report. That will happen within the next couple of weeks. We will have that report in our hands. Once that report is there they will try to work the money that we're getting from FEMA to have that barrier built. I don't think it's technically called a wall, at the old cemetery, where it has been slowly kind of sinking down towards the river, especially when we've had high water for two years. The water has been soaking up underneath the Old Cemetery. This has probably happened dozens of times over the 104 years. So there has been two different reports: there was an electronic scan of the property; and there was also a cadaver dog that came out. We have both of those reports. Apparently there are a few bodies that were actually slid out underneath the fence. So my question to the engineer was whether it was a wall they would have to dig down into the bedrock and bury in."

The engineer assured Sanders that it was more of a concrete barrier, kind of on the slope of the hill, that is going to go all the way around and keep the water hopefully from soaking up underneath. They will test how far the water has been seeping underneath first and what the water has done.

Summertime fishing and beating the heat

We have all heard of the dog days of summer and have had to adjust our fishing strategies; so, what do you do when your usual fishing hole is not producing? Many times in the summer, I have been skunked and needed to readjust my tactics, but you must think like a fish



if you want to successfully land a fish. Dan Ocampo, Kern River Fly Shop guide and store man-

ager, offers insightful thoughts on what to do so you can produce some bites with trout. Recently, in a conversation, I asked how he goes about fly fishing in the summertime. Kern River Fly Shop, owned by Guy Jeans, is in Kernville, California, and offers a beautiful selection of fly roads, flies, and gear that allows for successful fishing excursions, along with guide tours of the wild and scenic Kern River Valley's waterways. Dan states, "As a fly shop that operates year-round, we

work hard to determine the best time to fish and what parts of the river with ideal water temperatures will give us a better chance to get a tug. The ideal water temperature for rainbow trout that we are targeting is between 50 to 60 degrees".

Trout are finicky and require a Goldilocks environment to thrive. However, in the summertime, water temperatures can reach 70 degrees, creating stressed-out trout that turn to deeper, cooler waters so that they can survive. Ethically, we would not want to endanger the trout, so paying attention to the time of day and water temperatures is crucial for maintaining a healthy fishery.

Dan recommends that you "get out early, look for areas with riffled water with boulders about 2 to 3 feet deep where the fish may be hunkering down and looking for a morsel to pass their way. I've been wading into the freestone water as early as 6 AM but finding that the fishing doesn't turn on until about 7 to 8 AM. The point of getting out early in the morning is cooler water temperatures. As water temps warm into the high 60s and in some parts of the river 70 degrees, the fishing slows down, so we try to be off the water by 11 AM"

Angling techniques for the Kern River and neighboring streams vary in the summertime, and getting into the deep water requires tactful approaches, so you succeed. Trout typically does not hang out near the surface during hot weather, so being able to run deep is crucial to your technique. I prefer a nymph; they are ideal for deep or fast-moving water, mimicking small fish or aquatic insects.

Angler preparedness should match the ecosystem you're fishing in. Bait flies and lures should mimic the food sourc-

"Currently, the fly of choice that has been bending rods is a golden stonefly with a tungsten bead, helping to get it down faster. We've been seeing stonefly exo-skeletons on rocks along the bank of the river as long as 2 inches, if not a little longer. Being aware of the aquatic insects in and around the river helps us to match the hatch and increase

our catch rate," states Ocampo. 'It's crucial you get it down to the zone where the fish are facing upstream, looking at the fly you are presenting at the current speed. If you see your indicator move, even slightly down, make sure to hook-set - if you don't, you'll

never know if a fish took your fly," Ocampo says. Ultimately, everyone has techniques that work we fishing. However, when you find yourself in a slump, it may be wise to change it up and see if learning new tactics will help produce fish on the stringer. Remember, while it may be cool in the mornings, temperatures rise quickly, so sun protection and staying hydrated are essential.

Lake Isabella, CA - The Kern County Library announces the temporary closure of the Kern River Valley Branch Library located at 7054 Lake Isabella Blvd, Lake Isabella, from Tuesday, October 1, 2024, through Monday, March 31,

This closure, approved by the Kern County Board of Supervisors on June 30, 2024, under Resolution #2024-207, is necessary to carry out life-safety and critical maintenance improvements funded through the

Building Forward Library Infrastructure Grant administered by the California State Library. During this closure, various upgrades will be made across the facility, including security upgrades, layout improvements, flooring upgrades/replacement, and network accessibility upgrades. The branch is scheduled to reopen to the public on Tuesday, April 1, 2025.

To ensure continued access to library services during the closure, the Department will provide express library services via a pop-up tent Thursdays through Saturdays, 12-4 pm, in the library parking lot, weather permitting.

Express library services available via the parking lot pop-up:

- Check out library materials
- Return library materials Pick up book requests
- Place holds
- Carry-Out Crafts The book drop will remain open

and available for library material drop-offs for Kern River Valley area residents throughout the closure. Residents are encouraged to connect with branch staff through the call center located at Library HQ in Bakersfield for questions or assistance with holds, accounts, programs,

minutes, which were found to be severely behind, leaving a lack of transparency, Schutstz said, "We are current on the minutes so we are in compliance. With regard to F4 in the Grand Jury's findings, the failure of

some trustees to remain current on required training, which had caused the district to be non-compliant, the chairman trustee said, the district was already in progress. Trustee Mike Ryan had almost completed his training and Kat Barnum was in the process of finishing hers that day. Pertaining to F5, where the report said that the board had

been negligent in securing and overseeing personnel to maintain financial audits current, having caused the district to become delinquent in mandated County and State filings; Schutstz said, "Negligence on county and state mandatory financial audit filings, I'm saying that we are in progress on that." The press notes that the board had, in recent months, brought in a CPA to bring these filings up to date.

"We're still going to be using the river, even though we don't have Riverside Park. Everything will be moved to Circle Park," said president of the club, Fred Roach.







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Church provides new direction for grieving congregation

The Kern River United Methodist Church welcomed its new pastor Shawn Collins in July. Worship leader Tom McKinney invited the Kern Valley Sun to interview Collins and introduce him to the local community, Friday August 16. Collins' arrival was a welcome new phase after the congregation mourned the loss of its former pastor, Jean Sidner, who passed away mere months ago.

Pastor Collins admits he's not perfect, which should assure locals he's not prideful in his faith. "I had some troubles in my life," he said. How Collins became a pastor in Kernville

is a long back-story. He said, "They called me. I had been preaching all over, in different places, and the community of Kern County, all over the conference, as well as speaking engagements for other organizations, carrying the message of recovery and of salvation through Christ.'

Collins, in the tradition of the olden days circuit riders, has always wanted to be an evangelist. He said, "I'm a circuit rider like John Wesley. As a result of what he's done we have a lot of denominations that believe in Jesus. I knew God called me. So here I am."

Collins said he had passed through this area before. "I passed through Kernville one time and ate at a pizza place (Pizza Barn.) I passed through previously and looked at the river and scenery. The congregation has warmly welcomed

Collins. He said, "I've been assigned there for now. I'm a certified lay minister (CLM). I serve at the altar. When the conference calls me, that's where I go."

Yet Collins' faith journey grew over a long process beginning when he was doing self help meetings in the basement of the church where Narcotics Anonymous met. He went upstairs

to thank the United Methodist Church for allowing the group to meet there because of his success in recovery. So when he went upstairs and heard the church singing "And they'll know we are Christians by our love..." Then he fell in love with the denomination.

Collins attended Cal State Bakersfield to become a drug and alcohol counselor when God called him to attend Summit Bible College. "I started exploring Jesus in a real, real way. And I started to work on this intimate relationship with Christ. And He sent me through a lot of training with the United Methodist Church as I was getting my degree at Summit Bible College. I started asking the Father what should I do, where should I go, and He led me to Trinity United Methodist Church. I was able to close that church during COVID. And then He led me to Wesley United Methodist Church in Bakersfield and doing some of the training that Wesley provided I became a certified lay minister. And as a result of being a certified lay minister a place opened at Kernville UMC. I asked the Lord why Kernville. And He said to me, someone's heart is required and they don't even know there's some hardness in their heart. And you're supposed to be my representative.

Collins was able to develop a food ministry called the Mansion of Life, feeding children, and serving widows and orphans during COVID, helping the United Methodist Church doing disaster relief. He said, "During COVID we helped people pay the rent. So the Lord has been working with me the whole time.'

Collins' youth was filled with Christianity. His mother sent him to a Catholic school as a young child where the sister would sing the same song, "And they'll know we are Christians by our love." Collins said, "Almost 25, 30 years later and those missionary women were singing that song, I felt right at home, the tears started streaming down my face. And I

felt like this is it."

As a result of his faith getting stronger Collins said he has been delivered from any addictions to cigarettes, doesn't need to drink, or live a wayward lifestyle.

Collins was honest with the press about the alcohol and abuse he witnessed growing up. "I learned that Jesus is the only way for me. My grandmother started me off going to a Pentecostal church. She took me to a holiness church on some weekends. But on the other weekends, the other side of my family took me to a Southern Baptist church. And during the week my mother had me in Catholic school.'

Recovery from addiction becomes a spiritual one, practicing spiritual principals like love, which entails patience. Collins has also been teaching men in prison how to stay clean and to change their lives. Collins believes God wanted him to present God to others, outside the church, without any specific denominational preference. Referring to his favorite hymn he said, "If I demonstrate the love of Christ, then I can go anywhere and speak with anyone, and just demonstrate the love that Christ has for me."

Now Collins wants to share the love of Christ in the Kern River Valley. He's currently three courses away from his doctorate degree at seminary. "I want to show God my appreciation for all that He has done for me, from where He has brought me, to where I am now," he said.

Collins wanted to reassure the public that it's okay to be open to getting help. He said, "We've entered a day where people don't have to be afraid. Everybody makes mistakes and when people get off track, we're planning to help people get back on track. That's what we want to do. We're planning on providing counseling for individuals. Sometimes people get into trouble. Sometimes people need help.'

JV Broncs football team returns 10 as season starts

The younger Broncs football team is ready for the season to begin. They encounter McFarland to open the year in a Thursday night battle. Kern Valley will go on the road to take on the Cougars. Kick off is slated for 5 p.m.

Head coach Bill Gallis is once again holding the reins for the JV Broncs. It's his second year at the helm of Kern Valley. Gallis begins his 12th season as a coach at Kern Valley High School. Filling out the rest of the coaching staff is Aaron LaFarga, Bill Chase, Davin Lee, and Kenny

Kern Valley goes into the season with the proverbial target on their backs. They are the returning HDL champions and are looking to repeat the effort from last season. The Broncs return 10 players from the title team and this experience gives them a leg up as the prepare for this year.

The goal for the JV Broncs this year according to Gallis is for the players to play the game of football, learning as they go, and to advance their talents in order to be competitive at the varsity level. Gallis talking about the goal said, "The main goal is to get these kids to fall in love with football, bettering themselves and preparing them for the game of life. Once they get to that point, I want them hungry to play varsity football and to compete at a high level."

Gallis commenting on the non-league said, "Competition, I want to see who is willing to compete and put the team first. We are inexperienced this year, so I am hoping to get the kids a lot of reps at different positions."

As the defending champions, the JV Broncs will have to contend with the ever-present Bishop squad and a Rosamond Roadrunner team that is on the rise. In order to accomplish this, Kern Valley have to be prepared to take care of the teams that will be coming for them. Gallis said, "Bishop will be solid, and Rosamond is emerging as a

team to watch out for."

At the JV football level, a team must be talented and be able to avoid the injury bug. They also have to be able for players to be interchangeable as they do battle on the field. According to Gallis the strength of his team is their athleticism. He said, "We are very athletic and can develop depth at every position." On the flip side, the area for the Broncs that need work is gaining the game experience needed to compete with their opponents. Gallis stated, "We are inexperienced, these kids just need reps and playing time. We have a tough nonleague schedule so this should help us develop quickly."

In closing Gallis commented, "I am really excited for this upcoming season. We had a banner year last year, bringing JV football back to Kern Valley with a title after a four-year absence, and I just want to continue to help grow the program in a positive way. Varsity head coach Scott Tedrow has been a tremendous help getting us the resources we need to compete, and this year's team has a chance to duplicate last year's success. I'd like to take this time to thank everyone who helps support and fund Kern Valley football and to those who dedicate their time to make these kids dreams come true. I just invite everyone to come out and watch these kids play and show them the support they deserve."

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
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
