## Combined agencies thwart fires, apprehend arsonist

In a press release from Captain Andrew Freeborn of the Kern County Fire Department's Arson Division, Freeborn announced to the Kern Valley Sun, Thursday August 29, the arrest of a suspected arsonist at the recent Way Incident-Vegetation Fire.

The incident occurred south of the Kernville Airport where crews arrived discovering multiple roadside fires, which according to Supervisor Phillip Peters numbered 14 total, though the press has yet to confirm the actual number with fire officials. Peters announced Thursday, at a public meeting at Paradise Cove Lodge, that the alleged arsonist was caught, who unexpectedly started a string of fires in the Kern Valley.

Supervisor Peters said, "There was an arsonist that started these fires. And Kern County Sheriff's office was chasing him, pursuing him, with a helicopter. They turned the pursuit over to CHP and the suspect ended up getting in a wreck, on Orlando Road and Tobias, in Kernville. And they have him in custody."

Freeborn's press release from the Arson Investigation Department of the KCFD said that the California Highway Patrol officers and Kern County Sheriffs Office deputies tracked down the suspect named Jamal Lokepa Buyuan from Pahala, Hawaii. The suspect was arrested on eight counts of arson on Forest land. Freeborn said there might be additional charges pending from other involved agencies.

More units from US Forest Service arrived according to Freeborn's report,

which he put out to the press the same evening, though the KCFD units arrived about 10:45am that day.

Witnesses, to further ignitions down the road, revealed details leading to law enforcement broadcasts across fire command radio channels.

The significant progress with controlling the fires was through efforts of KCFD and USFS working tirelessly, up steep hillsides, constructing control lines using hand tools and extending hose lines. Aerial support from CAL FIRE, USFS, and KCFD aircraft precisely targeted water and retardant drops, which aided ground operations.

Freeborn's report noted that the swift, coordinated response efforts from Bureau of Land Management, USFS, and KCFD, halted the progress of the fires at less than 90 acres.

## Chamber ponders limiting Airbnbs at meeting

The public expressed varying views on a heated topic, when the Kernville Chamber of Commerce met Monday, August 26. At the request of community members, the chamber has been eager to address the controversial idea of potentially limiting Airbnb numbers in the town of Kernville, through some form of ordinance, via the county.

Ideally the chamber wishes to allow this be a community effort to bring balance between the two views, for and against, limiting numbers of Airbnbs in Kernville

Some chamber members and locals have expressed exasperation toward dwindling permanent resident numbers and school student enrollment numbers, blaming these problems on the large numbers of Airbnbs. This was amid complaints about other nuisances within those neighborhoods where renters of Airbnbs temporarily reside.

Staff representing Congressman Vince Fong's office was present amid

the crowd attending the meeting. Jim Damian the chief economic development officer from Kern County was at the meeting and said he was taking notes and that Supervisor Phillip Peters was interested about what was shared at the meeting. "My model of good government is trying to stay out of the way," Damian said. "If you have an Airbnb here, you pay a 6% transit occupancy tax, to the county. So that's

the small intervention, that the county did, a number of years ago."

Tim Lambirth, an attorney residing in Kernville, said he wrote a letter to Supervisor Phillip Peters and the chamber on the topic of potentially limiting Airbnb numbers in Kernville. His letter was actually what brought the topic to the forefront of debate in

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## Supervisors adopt \$4.4 billion budget

The number is high but the future is solid if you look behind the numbers of the Kern County 2024-2025 budget adopted by the county elected officials last week.

Total budget is \$4.4 billion, an increase of \$10 million (0.23%) over last year's fiscal plan.

"This week, the board adopted a balanced budget that shows respect for taxpayers, and support for employees. Our budget reflects our values. It shows our commitment to public safety and an effort to improve the quality of life for the people of Kern County," Chairman of the Board David Couch said in a release to the press.

"It is heavy on our effort to support law enforcement and parks. That was my goal," he added. "And if you look at the big picture we have planned for the future."

First District Supervisor Phillip Peters who represents Ridgecrest and the Kern River Valley offered:

"Kern County's 2024-2025 budget is roughly \$4.4 billion dollars. With this funding, we have heavily prioritized public safety and infrastructure improvements, including roads and parks in particular. While this year's budget reflects a growth of only 0.23%

over last year,
"I am pleased to say that thanks to
County staff's hard work we are able to
make these investments without relying
on one-time funding sources for any
ongoing costs and in fact, have been
able to set aside additional funds in
anticipation of future needs.

"We will continue striving to be good stewards of tax payer dollars, and utilizing resources as efficiently as possible, while continuing to fight for the industries and economic opportunities that make Kern County one world's leaders in energy and agriculture..""


On law enforcement funding Peters said while he did not have the exact figure he said roughly \$58 million in Measure K funds -86% of the money went to law enforcement.

According to Elsa Martinez, interim county administrative officer Measure K funds will be districted with 39% going to Kern County Fire Department; Kern County Sheriff Department receiving 37% and Kern County DA office receiving 9%.

The remainder of the Measure K money went to libraries, 6%, and behavioral health, 4%

Measure K was approved by unincorporated area voters in 2022.

The county budget also funds 8,860 worker positions.

## County supervisor speaks in Lake Isabella | Artists hold Labor

Supervisor Phillip Peters addressed some Kern Valley issues, in a speech at the Kern Valley Exchange Club luncheon meeting, Thursday August 29, which Paradise Cove Lodge hosted.

Peters opened his speech discussing the budget the County Board of Supervisors passed this year. He said there was not a lot of growth in the budget this year. "We passed the budget this week. Our county budget this year is at \$4.4 billion, which is pretty similar to our budget last year. It's just under a quarter percent bigger, or about \$10 million bigger, than it was last year. Also we've taken a huge hit to the budget because of the state's limitations on oil and gas production. We've been able to balance the budget. We haven't had to cut any services."

Peters said that the county was able to prioritize public safety. There will be one fire academy graduating and another academy starting. A Sheriff's academy is starting as well.

Roads and parks are another priority to the board. He reminded the public about the recent skate park opening, which citizens worked to bring forth, with help from the county. He brought up Tank Park receiving a FEMA grant enabling the repair, beginning this month, to fencing, light poles, resurfacing the playground, picnic tables, gravel and work on an embankment. Riverside park received a \$2.2 million FEMA grant to repair walkways and picnic tables, benches,

basketball courts exercise equipment, playground equipment, barbeques, water, electrical, and turf. The hope is to have it all ready, early next year, in time for Whiskey Flat Days, according to Peters. He said working on the project at Riverside Park, shoring up the embankment, would begin probably March 2025.

The library was granted \$470,000 for upgrades, according to Peters.

Sierra Way has been a huge issue. He said, "We are anticipating construction is going to be done in October."

Peters said that the Borel Fire is considered 96% contained. He's hoping the feds will move that to 100% containment so the recovery process can begin. Peters said phase one clean up, toxic and substance control, for residential properties is expected to take about in a month, which the state does, as a service. Phase two would begin after that, removing ash, after the okay from Office of Emergency Services.

September is here! That means a return of colorful leaves on trees, football season, and Labor Day. Labor Day signals the unofficial end of summer. Labor Day is also the last major holiday before the wonderful, hectic, and sometimes chaotic time of "the holiday season" arrives.

Winter may be approaching but the Fall season is my favorite. The cooler nights and cooler daytime temperatures are a welcome change to the searing heat and dry conditions we face in the "dog days" of summer.

Fall is also a time when major decisions regarding healthcare are also made. The open enrollment period for Medicare recipients is

October 15, 2024, to December 7, 2024.

This can sometimes be a stressful time for some as decisions regarding your healthcare will be in affect for the next year. During this time, people can enroll in, renew, or change their Medicare plan. I highly recommend contacting Kern County Aging and Adult Services to receive counseling on changes to Medicare and the various plan options available to seniors.

The County's Health Insurance Counseling and Advocacy Program (HICAP) is a service for those age 65+ and/or disabled to have a discussion with a trained counselor. The options for Medicare coverage are many and not all plans are right for you. A HICAP counselor can walk you through the various options and coverages each plan may provide. HICAP counselors do NOT sell the healthcare policies, nor do they make recommendations on a provider. Once you

have the information you need to make an informed decision of what plan works best for you, please see a trusted insurance agent for purchase. Not all plans are the same and not all health insurance agents sell all the available plans.

This brings me to another sometimes uncomfortable topic - Medicare fraud! It is rampant throughout our nation and attacks the most vulnerable populations. If you feel pressured to buy a particular Medicare policy or buy a product that you feel uncomfortable with, please contact the "Senior Medicare Program" - 855-613-7080.

Senior Medicare Patrol (SMPs) empower and assist Medicare beneficiaries, their families, and caregivers to prevent, detect, and report healthcare fraud, errors, and abuse. Receiving healthcare from a fraudulent provider can mean the quality of the care is poor. A fraudulent provider can result in false diagnoses, records showing

received, incorrect lab results and more. If Medicare thinks such services were already provided, they will deny payment.

will result from errors, and abuse. Fraud could result in higher out-of-pocket costs for beneficiaries, such as copayments for health care services that were never provided, were excessive, or were medically unnecessary. There is a canine haven located in Bodfish named SOS Dog Rescue. SOS stands for Strength of Shadow. Shadow is the personal dog of Robbie Miller and Jen Haratani, the founders of SOS Dog Rescue. Her story (Shadow) of rescue and resilience and the strength she exuded throughout all of it was the inspiration behind the founding of Strength of Shadow Dog Rescue, Inc.

#### What is the history of SOS dog rescue and when was it established?

SOS Dog Rescue was founded in April 2018 by Robbie Miller with the help of Jen Haratani and the Board of Directors. Our Mission was and is still simple, to rescue dogs and save people at the same time. We rescue dogs from high kill shelters within

Kern County, rehabilitate them both medically and mentally, and then find them adoptive homes. Over the years we have also secured a rescue ranch which is where most of the magic happens. We have multiple programs within the organization such as Operation Keep Pets In Home which provides resources to residents of the Kern River Valley for their pets. To date we have distributed over 100,000 lbs of dog and cat food, provided collars and personalized ID tags for well over 3,000 dogs, hosted and sponsored multiple no/low cost spay and neuter clinics as well as vaccinations and microchips. We also launched Fix your Pet to Fix Your City, which is a low cost spay and neuter program for residents of Kern County, mostly

the Bakersfield area. In 10 months we have funded/ co-funded clinics 4-5 times a month and have been able to provide surgery for over 2500 pets in underserved areas. We are also a proud partner of Kern SAFE, an animal coalition that provides education and resources in an effort to eliminate euthanasia for space in our

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

recent weeks. Lambirth said, "I'm not out to ban Airbnbs We need them. Maybe we don't need so many of them. That's above my pay grade. But we survive on tourism. We need the tourists. But we also need to get by when the tourists aren't here. So we need a healthy balance.'

Lambirth used Placer County, where Lake Tahoe is located, for an example of how this issue has been handled in similar tourist areas where Airbnbs are prevalent. "They've come out with a nice Short Term Rental (STR) law," he said.

Locals expressed multiple opinions on the issue including several Airbnb business owners assuring the public that they are responsible about monitoring guests at their property and that they provide jobs. At least the same amount of neighbors expressed their annoyance regarding nuisances attributed to Airbnb tenants disturbing the peace in what

neighborhoods. Residents at the meeting pondered why zoning laws allow businesses such as an Airbnb in residential zoned areas. While others said short-term rentals are not a new thing at all and property rights ought to prevail, hoping for a happy medium to this and future talks on the matter.

they described as once quiet

In a previous chamber meeting some chamber board members supposed school enrollment was dwindling because of too many homes being used for Airbnbs, a discouragement to permanent residents enrolling students for Kernville Elementary School. At this meeting community members were questioning whether lagging enrollment levels were more likely due to the schools and the direction education has been heading with charter schools and other options available to parents. Chamber vice president

Gary Ananian, who was leading the meeting in president Orion Sanders' absence, suggested that student numbers dwindling may not necessarily be because of the Airbnbs but may actually be because of the home school movement growing. Ananian said that he runs kids programs, through the Kern River Conservancy, which he founded. Numbers of students within his groups, per program, have quadrupled since COVID, including students from Porterville and Ridgecrest as well as Kernville. Ananian's observation was that some parents working remotely have more time to school their child at home, while other parents could be home educating for political or other health reasons. He sees a lot of parents are pulling their kids out of public schools in general. "When I take kids out rock climbing there's 60 kids and 45 of them were going to Kernville Elementary last year and now they're not," Ananian said.

Christine Dochterman, owner of Clean Getaways said her company does cleaning and property management, and has nearly 40 rentals and employs eight people. She encouraged the public to call her with any complaints about issues with her rentals because her number is listed on signage at her rentals. She also encouraged the public that people could complain about other poorly run vacation rentals at the Airbnb system.

Local resident Mike Woodward lives in the same block as four other neighbors in the meeting complaining about several Airbnbs within their neighborhood. "As I see it there's major issues that we've had. An absent owner of an Airbnb who is across the street from me, next to Bill. Party house, that's all it's been since they started up about three years ago. We've had major issues," he said.

Actually I'd like to own one myself because I love the idea of making money off of real estate. But my point is that we have a density issue on our street, way disproportionate." Woodward said that if the

owners of the rentals were more responsible he wouldn't have a problem. He thought the amounts of units should be limited. He said locals had to deal with drug issues; hot tub pot smokers keeping them awake at 3am, people camping on their block, and a biker group on their street. "We ran it through LAPD. We found out that they were (in) the 10 most wanted motorcycle gangs in Los Angeles," said Woodward.

Ananian told those attending the meeting that there would be future meetings addressing this issue.



#### **Transitional Weather Fishing and Hunting Tips**

SPENCER SHEPARD

With temperatures ranging from summertime to heat waves, Lake Isabella has had a great week of fishing and hunting. Catfishing on the lake is incredibly excellent a few hours after sunset. The D8 hunting zone is producing archery season bucks.

Something that drives me during the end of the summer is the return of better bites. Fishing starts to pop off on the lake as the weather slows down and fall approaches. Channel catfish are becoming more active in the cooler, oxygenated waters of the primary dam side of Lake Isabella. Catching channel cats in the late summer is fun, especially if you find a good hole.

I often find the points around French Gulch, Boulder Gulch, and Engineers Points to offer epic nights of fishing. I often reminisce about a late summer fishing experience with my brother Luke, fishing in French Gulch, where we caught limits of catfish under a full moon. We both enjoy a simple double dropper loop setup, with a half-ounce to one-ounce weight on the end, so you can quickly get to deeper waters. I often find that with shad on one hook and a crawler on

the other, I tend to at least get bites quicker. However, when all else fails, I'll slob a hook-up with Garlic Powerbait and typically get hits with this. Channel cats are not picky eaters, so a few baits work: cut pieces of shad, chicken livers, nightcrawlers, or commercially prepared stink baits. September is a transitional weather month, with summer

ending and fall approaching. So, you can expect to see a bass of good size if you are a savvy angler. Bass change in September, so you begin the month like you would fish for them in summer by fishing deep. And by the end of the month, you will be using fall fishing tactics. Topwater action will improve as the water cools and the

fish becomes more aggressive. Depending on the weather pattern, they might be shallow or deep. On hot days, fish deep with either medium or deep-diving crankbaits. On cooler days, later in the month, you'll see shallow and topwater lures start to work.

D8 is a great zone to hunt with big bucks, but you must work. Bucks are active right now in the early mornings til the temps begin to rise; after the heat comes, they will be looking to bed down and not overstress themselves. And then become active again as the evening comes. Please put in the time to scout and look for signs of deer in the area, such as scat, beds, or the native plants they like to eat. Hunters must possess a zone appropriate deer tag, being valid in the archery or general season. And use the right methods of take. California Department of Fish and Wildlife provide general area advice, specific to the zone you may want to hunt. Look at that and maybe incorporate it into what you know about the zone.

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
