Kernville Chamber clears confusion regarding Airbnb stand

The Kernville Chamber of Commerce board addressed the issue of the board's views regarding limiting Airbnbs, in Kernville, to clarify the issue for the public. This announcement was made at the outset of the Monday, October 28 general meeting of the chamber.

Board president Orion Sanders said, that evening, "It's important to understand that we (the chamber board) can't do anything. We cannot dictate or control or impose anything as far as county ordinances are concerned. And so we also don't take a stance, one way or the other, because we have members that are on both sides of the issue. So it is not our position to take a side. It's our position to facilitate the conversation on the agenda."

Indeed various members of the chamber had stated separate and individual viewpoints, during meetings and outside of meetings, regarding details about the idea of county officials taking aim toward limiting Airbnbs in the town of Kernville. Though none of these individual views were expressed as a solidified chamber board viewpoint.

In a crowd packed September meeting where the chamber invited Supervisor Phillip Peters and other county officials, Sanders said, "Obviously what keeps Kernville alive during winter is full time residents. Most of the brick and mortar business (owners) can

tell you that during the winter it's gone down in the last few years. We can presume that it's based on the fact that we don't have those full time residents using all the businesses and facilities through the wintertime. To balance that out we've put a lot of effort into tourism and recreation during the spring through fall to try to get those people from out of county to spend their dollars in this county." Sanders stated there's a balance between needing Airbnbs to accommodate tourism and meeting the need for jobs to draw full time residents. "I believe that the county needs to invest in the recreation and tourism of the Kern River Valley, to help build those businesses back up, to make that balance between the Airbnbs and full time residents."

On Thursday October 31 in a

private telephone interview Sanders stated, "The board doesn't have any control over any of that. All we did was facilitate a meeting, and give the public a forum with our county representatives to have that conversation. But we as a chamber have no control over what happens in County regulations or anything."

Sanders also clarified saying, "In situations like that we can't take a position because we have individual members that have opinions on both sides of the issue. So I can't let my board express an opinion one way or the other. And it's not for us to take a position on or decide county regulations or policies. So all we did was let the people know the county was going to be there. But we have no control over what the county does."

us to feel like we're going to lose and left feeling lost. Additionally, questions like "Is it worth it?" or "Maybe I should just quit?" arose as depression crept in; I had to choose to win. I had to fight my depression and not let it define me.

"Depression is a common and disabling mental illness, prevalent worldwide across all ages, genders, and races," according to the Indian Journal of Psychological Medicine.

So, I decided to take my health and mental wellness into my own hands by figuring out how to climb out of my mental pit of despair. I started by just getting outside and enjoying the sunlight and fresh air. Sunlight for at least 15 minutes daily helps with psychological and physical health.

"Best-known benefit of sunlight is its ability to boost the body's vitamin D supply," states the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences.

The skin absorbs Vitamin D through a photosynthetic reaction, which, in turn, promotes bone health and increases dopamine levels in the brain. An increase in dopamine levels allows depression to subside. With healthy dopamine levels, people are alert, happy, and alive.

To excavate reality, I had to find what was real, what was tangible, and something that brought me

peace. Hiking brought me peace because I no longer was stuck to a WiFi signal; life became real. As I hiked, I noticed the birds nearby' melodic songs, and the sun comforted me like a warm blanket fresh out of the dryer. On my hikes, life became slower, and I became a sponge to Nature.

I told a friend about my new ethos, and he recommended Ralph Waldo Emerson's essay Nature for me to read so I could continue excavating reality. Emerson writes Nature to explain the spiritual and personal enlightenment that only some can glean from the natural world. And I began to etch every word Emerson wrote into my psyche because he helped me find peace as I began to understand his wisdom. "The lover of nature is he whose inward and outward senses are still truly adjusted to each other; who has retained the spirit of

infancy even into the era of manhood," states Emerson in Nature.

So, I found new hiking trails to explore and changed my diet, I began seeking out ways to get nutrient-rich foods into my diet, and I started by making smoothies twice a day as a substitute for breakfast and lunch. At dinner, I make healthier meals now while practicing portion control.

My smoothies usually consist of water, raw ginger, blueberries, non-fat plain Greek yogurt, local honey, and spinach because of their respective nutritional properties. Ginger helps with digestion, lessens nausea, and helps fight the flu and common cold. Blueberries can help boost immunity and lower the possibility of diabetes, obesity, and heart disease.

Foundation awards United Way for Borel Fire victims

The Kern Community Foundation, a philanthropic group seeking to better Kern County and the Kern River Valley, awarded United Way of Central Eastern California (UWCEC) a \$10,000 grant to help families of the valley who have been displaced because of the Borel Fire last summer. Grand Marshal gives dog park update

Locals may be wondering whatever happened to the Kernville Happy Tails Dog Park, which the community contributed for, when SOS Dog Rescue founder Robbie Miller and founder of the Kern River Conservancy, Gary Ananian ran for Whiskey Flat Days Mayor. Monday, October 28, at the Kernville Chamber of Commerce meeting, Ananian, who is now vice president of the chamber, told the board he had two bids on the dog park construction. The lowest bid he had was \$40,000. However the Kern County Planning Department has sent him bill, after bill, after bill without end. He has told County Supervisor Phillip Peters' Field Director, Cody Criswell that he has questions about these constant bills, and had not gotten any answers. Ananian hoped Criswell would look into the matter. Ananian heard suggestions from the chamber board for ideas about raising more money. He said, "My goal is to apply for the Parks Grant from the State (of California) in the spring. That one is usually about two or \$3 million we can apply for. I'd rather we do that because we could do

everything at once. So then we could completely renovate that entire part, Dog Park, Bike Park, Rodeo, Baseball Field, Pickleball Courts and everything in one shot." The Happy Tails Dog Park project still needs fencing and running pipes, from the baseball field to the dog park, for water for the dogs, according to what Ananian told the Kern Valley Sun last summer. The biggest hurdles Ananian and Miller faced, during initial stages, included modifying and changing the zones to include the dog park. Not changing the zoning of the property would have ended up costing a lot more money. The project has been held up, at the county level, during approval stages. After Kern County Board of Supervisors finally approved the park, June 18, the project was planned to begin construction after a contractor bidding process. However, afterward bills continued to come in from the county, using up a lot of the funds, which the Whiskey Flat mayor team, Grand Marshal Gary and Rescue Robby worked hard to raise.

Firefighters put out fire and rescue animal

Community foundation visits chamber

At the last Kernville Chamber of Commerce meeting October 28, the chamber board had a larger amount of topics to address than usual, running the meeting over two hours.

Vice president of the chamber board, Gary Ananian had invited a special guest speaker to the chamber, which was the president and CEO from an organization, to speak. Ananian said, “I’ve invited Aaron Falk from the Kern Community Foundation to speak

today.” Falk introduced himself to refresh the memories of those at the meeting. “I’ve been up here a lot especially in the past when I was Kevin McCarthy’s field rep, for several years, for the Kern River Valley. It’s great to see some of you again.”

The CEO told the chamber that the KCF has been very active in the aftermath of the Borel Fire. “So far we’ve granted out over \$40,000 to non profits that are providing immediate relief,” he said.

The \$40,000 amount was not even one third of the money the KCF has to grant, according to

Falk. KCF still has a great deal of money to give away to organizations that would only spend the majority of the money on actual products for those in the Kern Valley area. This is one time money that does not necessarily refill. No money would go toward overhead though there are rare exceptions. For example the cost for paying to transport products donated, such as horse feed or hay bales, from one location to another. Examples of items KCF is generally looking to provide are things like pre paid visa cards, hygiene kits, batteries, gas and propane.

“There’s a very easy application

on our website KernFoundation.org. I’m looking to give away as much money as I can to non-profits up here that are directly helping people affected by the fire. I don’t want it going to large groups that are not going to be spending the money here,” Falk said. <https://www.kernfoundation.org/>

The KCF also runs over 40 different scholarships programs. One application is for all the scholarships to high school students going on to college or trade schools. In the last few years the KCF has received two estates, leaving substantial amounts of money to KCF, totaling \$7 million to give

away to students graduating from Kern Valley High School or other students of the valley. Falk said the money they inherited is an endowment, so the KCF invests the money and then earnings from it, generally 4% to 5% per year, or approximately \$300,000 per year, the KCF gives away. “Last year I had seven applicants.”

According to Falk applying for the scholarship is an easy application and includes an essay and letter of recommendation. Kern County Students - Kern Community Foundation

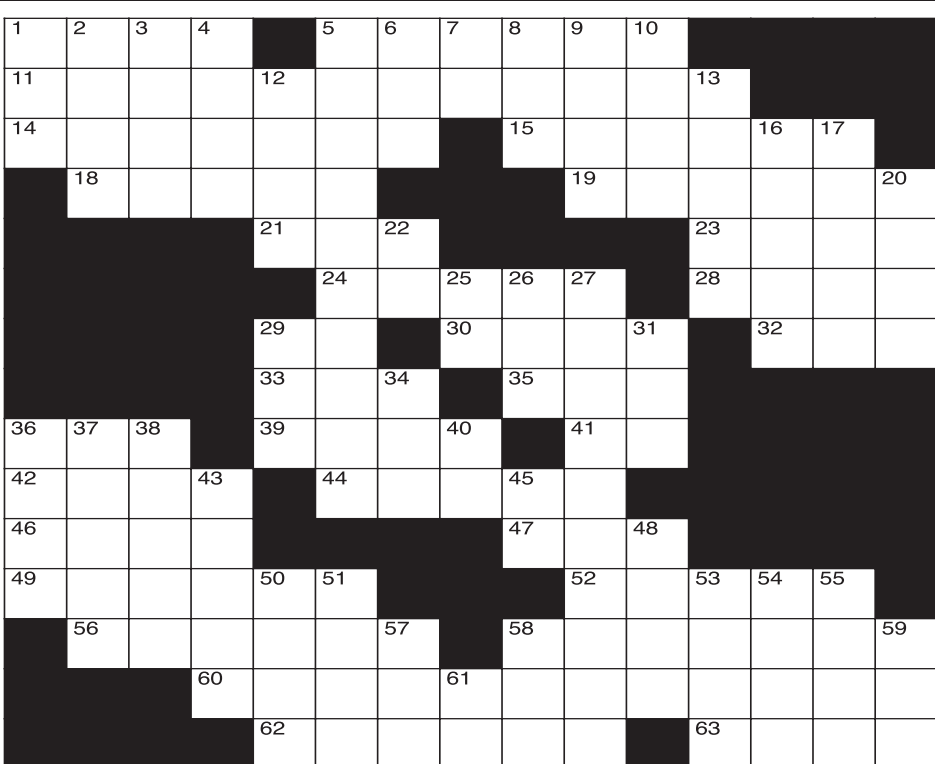

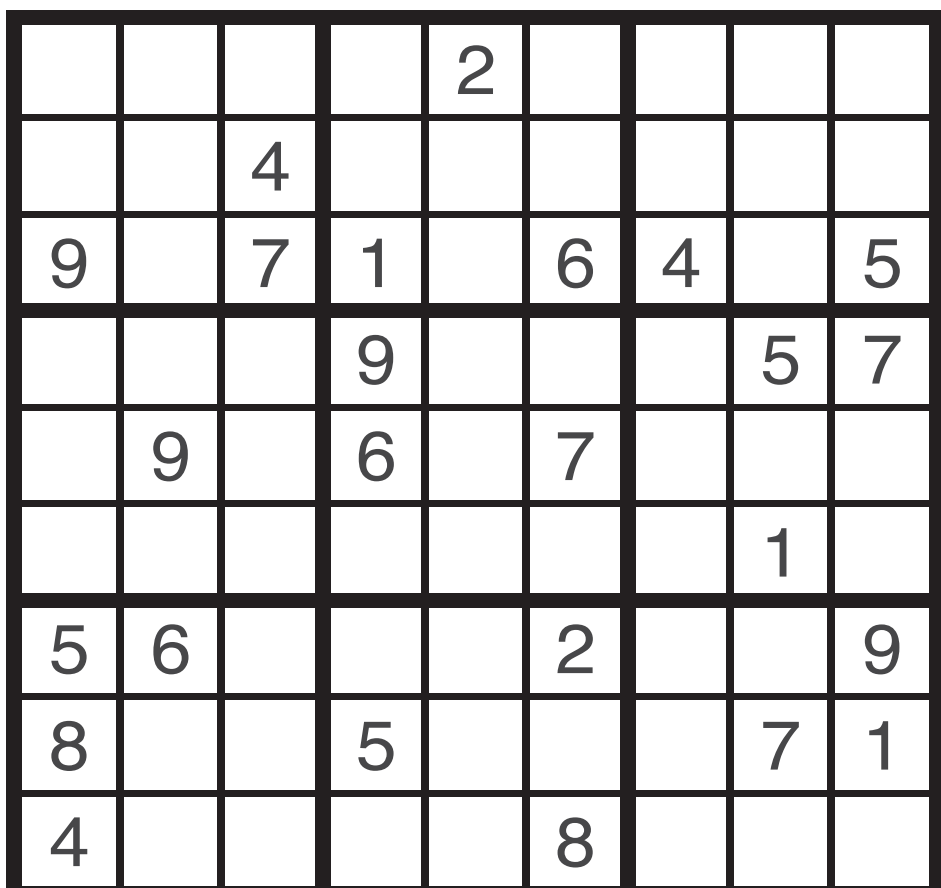

Broncs pick off Boron to secure varsity victory

The showdown was for second, but both teams played to win. The Kern Valley varsity team hosted Boron on Senior Night in a contest to decide who would grab sole possession of second place in the HDL.

They were able to steal the win with an interception as the Bobcats were trying to drive for the tying touchdown. The teams battled all game and made sure the fans go to see a well-played football game to end the regular season. Boron opened the scoring as they were able to punch it in and take the lead. They would convert the two-point conversion to make it 8-0 in the first.

The Broncs controlled the second quarter as their offense moved the ball down the field. The Kern Valley team scored a touchdown to get closer. They were not successful on the PAT to leave the score at 8-6 in favor of the Bobcats. The Broncs defense forced their opponent to give them the ball back. They did not waste the opportunity as they were able to cross the goal line to give them the lead. The half ended with the Broncs holding the advantage at 12-8.

Coming out of the break neither team could find the end zone in the third quarter. The score remained with the Broncs ahead 12-8. Early in the fourth, the Bobcats of Boron took back the lead with a touchdown. With the score sitting at 14-12, and the game winding down it was up to the Broncs defense to hold Boron. They would stop the Bobcats on a fourth down play. With just over two minutes left in the game Kern Valley took possession. The Broncs moved quickly down the field and into position to score. With just 23 seconds on the clock, Kern Valley moved the ball into the end zone to retake the lead. They added the two-point conversion and it was now 20-14. Boron had one last chance, but it ended when Daniel Hinkey picked off the attempted pass and the Broncs were alone in second place.

Zane Carver had his hands on every point for the Broncs. He threw for a 27-yard touchdown to Bryce Smoot and rushed twice for a pair of TD's. He also hooked up with Deegan Lee for the two-point conversion. On the night Carver was 13-25 passing and was intercepted three times. He threw for a total of 174 yards, completing passes to five different Kern Valley players. Smoot led the way with four catches for 79 yards and the score. Lee finished with six receptions for 37 yards, while Carson Parks had one grab

for 25 yards. Joey Galvan hauled in one pass for 20 yards, and Hinkey caught one pass for 13 yards. The Broncs were limited to just 43 yards of rushing in the game. Carver carried 10 times for 11 yards, while Parks had six touches and 32 yards. The total offense on the night was 217 yards.

Turning to the Kern Valley defense which kept the Bobcats in check most of the night. They were led by Hinkey with 24 tackles (seven solo) and the interception. Blake Baughman collected 21 tackles (five solo), while Tavin Watts had 18 (seven solo) tackles. Smoot finished with six tackles and picked off Boron quarterback. Ivan Mondragon recorded six tackles, while Lee and Galvan each had five. Aiden Madden was credited with three tackles, while Jacob Abraugh and Drake Posney each had a pair of tackles.

The Broncs head coach, Scott Tedrow commented, "That

was a very physical hard-hitting game. Both teams played hard for all four quarters, but we were able to put together the game winning drive in the fourth to seal the win. We stopped Boron on downs on our own 21 with 2:04 on the clock and no timeouts. We practice our two-minute offense every week, and Zane Carver was able to run it to perfection and lead us down the field for the game winning touchdown with only 23 seconds left on the clock."

With the game in the books, the Broncs will now turn to the CIF playoffs. They will be at home on Friday as they will entertain Mira Monte. They start the playoffs as the No 5 seed. The Broncs defeated Mira Monte in the non-league and will square off with them again. The game is set to kickoff at 7 p.m.

Coming off the loss to Bishop, the Broncs had to regroup and refocus as Boron came to town for the final game of the year. The battle would decide who would finish in the runner up to Bishop in the HDL standings. Both teams would score all the points in the first half. The opening kickoff went to

the Broncs and they went on a march. They took it down to the 15-yard line of the Bobcats. Jackson Price and Gabe Ross made the connection and gave the Broncs their first points of the night. Despite the PAT miss, the Kern Valley team took the 6-0 lead.

They tried to keep their offense on the field as they attempted the onside kick on the ensuing kickoff. It was successful and the Broncs squad had the ball back. They were well on their way to increasing the score margin, but the Bobcats defense forced a fumble and gave them the ball for the first time. Boron made the most of it as they drove 75 yards to even the score at 6-6.

With the ball back in their possession, Kern Valley did not waste time. They put themselves in scoring position to possibly regain the lead. It was the Price to Shiloh Galvan connection that gave the Broncs the lead once again. The 10-yard scoring toss was followed by the successful two-point conversion. The scoreboard showed the home Broncs with the 14-6 cushion. The half would end with this score as the teams went into the break.

While the offense was showcased the first half, it was the Kern Valley defense's turn to strut their stuff in the second half. The Broncs offense thought they had put the game away twice, but both times penalties called back touchdowns. The Kern Valley defense took exception and made it a point to keep the Bobcats

away from scoring. The third quarter ended with the score still sitting at 14-6 for the Broncs.

The game went into the fourth with both teams playing flip flop on possessions and could not find any scoring. It came down to a final Boron possession with the chance to even the score. The Bobcats were facing a mammoth hill as they were pinned deep on a masterful punt that put them down deep in their own zone. Another defensive stop closed out the last gasp effort. On the night, the Broncs defense picked off three Boron passes. Z. Pappas, R. Pappas, and Galvan each had one interception. The Kern Valley as a team had seven tackles that were credited.

Humphers led the team with four tackles. Ethyn Henry had three tackles, including a sack. EJ Anderson had three tackles, with a sack. Galvan also recorded three tackles. Max Braughman followed with a pair of tackles. Getting credit for one tackle apiece were Braden Ege, Z. Pappas, Jaadyn Cleveland, Qwintin Paiseau, Tommy Pacheco, R. Pappas, Carlos Monzo, and Israel Padilla.

The Broncs head coach said, "With this win, the Kern Valley JV Broncs secured second place in the High Desert League, demonstrating resilience and a stellar defensive stand against a tough Boron squad. What a game. We knew Boron would be a formidable foe, and that was a tough, physical game. Both teams played hard and left it all on the field tonight. I am extremely proud of my team and how they competed until the end. Offensively, we did just enough to get it done, and the defense played phenomenal tonight. It was a very successful season for us, and I would just like to thank the boys for bringing it every day. These are a great group of young men, and I had a pleasure coaching them this year. Head coach Kenny Bushling said, "We participated in the John Seaman's Cross Country Invitational in Kingsburg hosted at the Kingsburg Gun club. There were 45 schools that competed and there was a large school and small school division. In the small school division, which is schools in D3, 4 and 5. A. Hacker took first place (83 runners competed in the race) and had a PR. K. Hacker and Boettcher both earned medals with a 12th and a 17th they also had PR's. The boys race ended up being a battle. The Broncos runners were able to come away with the 21-35 victory to keep them in a tight race for second in the HDL. 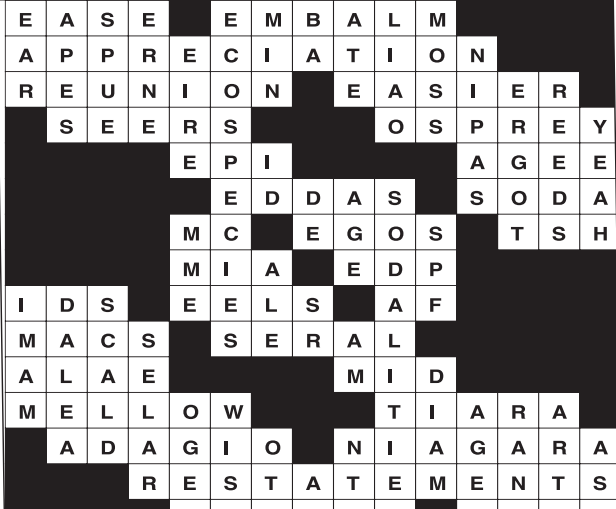
