years serving as Toys for Tots coordinator, Pickerell has taken a new turn in the way she is running the Marine Toys For Tots. "The Family Resource Center is managing the application side of things. They're doing the Tots. And I'm doing the Toys this year," she said.

The Family Resource Center is where people would go to apply to receive toys from Toys for Tots this year.

Pickerell is getting toys to agencies this year. She explained why, "I can't do the individual toy deliveries this year because I'm too busy. So the agencies are managing the applications. Owens Valley Career Development Center is also doing applications this year for their people."

Pickerell has been getting the bulk of toys donations from the Marine Toys for Tots Foundation, which was why she cannot host her events. The community must host events to raise toys for the children.

If any organization or business wants to host its own event on behalf of Toys for Tots they can host them. "The Chamber of Commerce is hosting a Toy Drive at the Christmas Parade this year," she said. Pickerell is not allowed to

spend any funds on anything other than toys. "My hands are really tied without the community's support," she said. "I typically try to put together a \$40 bag per child. The toys that I purchase I get at wholesale prices through contracted vendors with Toys For Tots. But again I don't have the funds to buy toys this year."





Safety blackout a wake-up-call for businesses

Residents and businesses in Kernville experienced an entire day of black out, which lasted into the late night hours, Wednesday November 6.

According to notices residents received, after the power came back on, the incident was referred to as a Public Safety Power Shutoff, due to high winds. Local businesses were not happy

about the power outage disruption. However they were also reluctant to speak on the record about their experiences for fear it would hinder their businesses. Though happily stores with refriger-

ated sections seemed to have back up generators. Folks around town anonymously

told the Kern Valley Sun that setting up the generators was a fairly inconvenient venture. Other businesses did not have generators. Residents and businesses complained they had no notification before the black out, which occurred because of the high winds. The event lasted from about 1pm until at least 11pm that night, though witnesses were not sure of the exact time the power came back on after they went to sleep. Businesses and residential areas all

the way up to McNally's had no SCE power. Even Airbnbs were flat out of luck, which was especially hard on families, with kids.

Diane Wilson, owner of Whiskey Flat Antiques & Gifts, which is a vendor mall, an emporium, was the only soul brave enough to talk on the record about how the whole debacle impacted her day and evening. She said, "To the best of my knowledge, everybody, in the entire town (was affected) and honestly with no forewarning. I didn't get notification from Edison that they were thinking about shutting the power off for half an hour after the lights went out. I was completely surprised by it. And I was in the middle of running monthly reports that I use to generate my vendor's checks. So I was pretty upset with Edison yesterday because

usually there's a lot of communica-

Wilson was trying to get the checks generated when the Kern Valley Sun called her on Thursday. Wilson said, "Everybody understands. But it was quite an impact when you had to close early, put a sign on the door." Wilson had no cash register, heat, or lights. "I can't think of anybody who wouldn't have had to close. I can't see where any business could function. My generator was at home. I didn't know

Later in the conversation Wilson finally recalled why she knew the time of day the whole disruption happened. "I had just put my lunch in the microwave. So I didn't even get to eat lunch until I got home," she said.

Wilson also thought the electricity actually came on late Wednesday night though Edison did not notify her until the early morning hours of Thursday. "Edison notified me somewhere around 4 and 5 am." She said, "It was inconvenient. But you take it in stride

SBA opens disaster loan outreach center in Lake Isabella

The Disaster Field Operations Center West sent notice to the press that the Small Business Administration (SBA) was providing relief loans to those suffering from the aftermath of the disastrous local fires.

Associate administrator, Francisco Sanchez Jr. representing the Office of Disaster Recovery and Resilience at the SBA in Sacramento announced previously that the opening of three Disaster Loan Outreach Centers was set up for meeting the needs of businesses and individuals affected by both the Borel Fire and the Park Fire, which

One center is being hosted at the Kern River Valley Senior Center in Lake Isabella, which started October 24. The deadline for applications is Dec. 20, 2024. The deadline to apply for economic injury is July 21, 2025. Sanchez said that the Disaster Loan Outreach Center in Lake Isabella would be open to Kern County residents Mondays through Fridays 8am to 5pm without any appointment. However the centers would be closed on Veterans Day.

At the center, people can connect directly with SBA specialists to apply for disaster loans and learn about the full range of programs available to rebuild and move forward with recovering.

SBA customer service representatives have been available to answer questions about SBA's disaster loan program, explain the application process and help each individual complete their electronic loan application. Any size business or private nonprofit organizations may borrow up to \$2 million for repairing and replacing damaged or destroyed property, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business assets.

Businesses that have sustained physical damage, or lost inventory, equipment or revenues, can apply for



help navigating resources available in person and online. SBA can help with submitting disaster loan applications and help businesses prepare to receive financial relief as soon as funds are replenished.

SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans for assistance meeting working capital necessities caused by the disaster. Help for economic injury is available whether or not the business suffered property damages, for small businesses, or agricultural co-ops and most private nonprofits, of any size.

This is the chance to incorporate measures reducing risk of future damage, work with contractors and mitigate professionals for strengthening property and to pro actively request additional SBA disaster loan funds.

SBA disaster loans up to \$500,000 would be available for homeowners repairing or replacing damaged, destroyed real estate. Homeowners or renters could be eligible for up to \$100,000 for repairing and replacing damaged and destroyed personal property, which includes personal vehicles.

Interest rates may be as low as 4 percent for businesses, 3.25 percent for private nonprofits and 2.688 percent for homeowners and renters with terms of up to 30 years.

Yet interest doesn't start to accrue until a year from the date of the

disaster loan disbursement. Loan repayment begins a year from the date of disbursement.

While no new loans can be issued until the US Congress appropriates additional funding, the SBA claims to remain committed to supporting disaster survivors. Applications currently continue. Therefore the SBA encourages applicants to submit applications promptly in anticipation that congress would approve future funding.

Applicants may apply online and receive additional disaster assistance information at SBA.gov/disaster. Applicants may also call SBA's Customer Service Center at (800) 659-2955 or email disastercustomerservice@sba gov for more information on SBA disaster assistance. For deaf, hard of hearing, or speech disability, please dial 7-1-1 to access telecommunications relay services

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

High-scoring contest gets Lions share of points

Kern Valley began it's CIF playoff run at home versus a team they beat 20-17 earlier in the season. This time the offenses exploded to score a combined 95 points.

The scoring came early and often as the two teams were looking to move on in the playoffs. The Broncs opened the scoring as they took the opening kickoff and used just four plays to find the end zone. Carson Parks took the hand off at the Kern Valley 43-yard line. He raced the 53 yards to cross the goal line and give the Brones the early lead. Tristan Beckham added the extra-point to make it 7-0. Mira Monte would answer with a 10-play drive to even the score at 7-7 with 4:09 left in the first quarter. Neither team would find the end zone the rest of the quarter to keep the scoreboard knotted at 7-7

After the Broncs turned the ball over on downs early on the second, Mira Monte used a methodical drive to put them into the lead. The score was sitting at 14-7 when the Kern Valley team responded. They passed their way down the field that ended with a 14-yard scoring toss from Zane Carver to Bryce Smoot. Lining up for the PAT, the snap was missed and the play was stopped to make the score 14-13 for the Lions. This is the way the half ended and both teams knew they were in a battle.

The Broncs kicked off to begin the second half. The Lions returner, grabbed the ball at the 20-yard line and rumbled his way for the 8- yards to push the Mira Monte margin to 21-13. Once again Kern Valley had an answer as they used the running game to get into scoring position. They capped off the drive with Carver finding Joey Galvan for the 13yard touchdown to close the gap to 21-19. They tried for the two-point conversion only to be stopped.

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








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
